



Activities to support <u>language comprehension</u>



Kindergarten-2nd Grade:

This is built **mostly** when students are **read or spoken to.** It can be in any language!



"Plus 1" Conversations

- Strike up a conversation! The topic can be anything.
 - a. Things you see outside
 - b. What you did that day
- Listen to your child's responses.
- 3. Repeat your child's response back to them. Add an extra word or detail!





Family member:	What do you see on that tree?
Child:	I see a bird.
Family member:	I see that bird. It is enormous. Do you know what enormous means?

Add a Word Story

Make up a story as a family. Each person gets to add one word at a time!

Encourages attention to sentence structure, grammar, and meaning.

Family Member 2:	I
Family Member 3:	saw
Family Member 1:	а
Family Member 2:	huge
Family Member 3:	spider

Experience the World Together Through Books!

Did you know?Kids under 13 can get their own library card!

- Visiting the library? Ask the librarian for recommendations of new books


 Open a book to any page. Start reading. Hold up a finger every time you see a word you do not know.

Activities to support word recognition



Kindergarten-2nd Grade:


This is built **mostly** when students are **reading**. It can be with books or hands-on games.



Salt Trays

- 1. Fill a tray with table salt.
- 2. Write **letters** or **words** on note cards. Shuffle them up!
- 3. Have your child pull a card and trace that letter or word in the salt while saying the sound or reading the word.

Even better: Have your child use a stick to practice proper pencil grip.





The Detective

Time for bed! Lights out!

- 1.Post your sight words by your bed.
- -on the wall
- on the ceiling (adult assistance needed
- 2. Use your flashlight to find the words.



Nursery Rhymes and Songs

Great for helping students recognize rhyming words, syllables, and sounds.

Can be in any language!

Challenge 1: Fill in the blank! Recite a familiar nursery rhyme, but leave a word out! Have your child say the missing word!


Challenge 2: Choose a word from a nursery rhyme and think of as many words as you can that rhyme with that word!

-Or try: think of as many words as you can that start/end with the same sound as your chosen word.
