

What is a Meet the Masters Volunteer?

The Meet the Masters Volunteer plans, prepares and teaches at least one meet the masters art lesson per trimester.

Key Responsibilities

- Attend training provided by the school Meet the Masters lead
- Review and pick dates for lessons with classroom teacher
- Communicate type of lesson, grouping and sessions needed with teacher for each project at least one week before the lesson
- Know where supplies are located and ask teacher for supplies at least one week before the lesson.
- Come fully prepared with all supplies needed
- Lead students in learning about the "Master Artist" and practicing an art technique
- Hang up art in the library during the "feature class week" and take down in a timely manner

Tips for Working with Students

- Manage small groups
 - Use a signal to get attention
 - Set expectations for your time together
 - Encourage positive behaviors by incorporating choices, when possible
 - Modeling can support studenets with limited oral language skills
 - Visual cues can minimize interruptions
 - Allow for a quick reflection of how things went at the end of your time together.
 - Consult with teacher if challenges are being experienced
