

## Enhancing our Learning Environment

### Classroom and Technology Upgrades at Lakewood

Lakewood construction is complete! We built 11 new classrooms; renovated 21; installed a new heating, cooling and ventilation system; replaced the roof; modernized the multi-use building; and equipped each classroom with mounted projectors, Apple TVs and increased Internet bandwidth.

The roughly \$18 million project is one example of how community support is benefiting our students. Our local school bond, Measure G, allows us to improve technology and make all schools more energy efficient. Our parcel tax, Measure B, funds classroom programs, allows us to attract and retain exceptional teachers and staff, and keeps class sizes small to enhance student learning.

### Up Next: Bishop and San Miguel

Bishop Elementary will be upgraded next, and will house our first two-story building, new classrooms, a media center, and a new multi-use building. The historic Bishop Theatre will be preserved to enable our young performers to showcase their emerging talents in the performing arts.

San Miguel will get a renovated canopy, eight brand-new classrooms and a new preschool play structure.





## Teacher Spotlight

### Teachers are Students Too

Learning is continuous in the Sunnyvale School District, for teachers and students alike. We use a train-the-trainer approach to build an in-house corps of instructional experts in all subject areas: academic, social-emotional, project-based learning, and more. We then leverage that expertise, sharing methods with each other so we can continually improve our effectiveness for our students.

### Teacher Gets an “A”

Jonathan Watts, six-year district veteran and instructional technology coach, was recently named Outstanding Educator of the Year by the Sunnyvale Chamber of Commerce at its annual Murphy Awards. Through his work with faculty and students, Mr. Watts helps our learning community to make the very best use of all available tools to ensure our students gain the skills they need for 21st century workforce success.

### High Expectations. Strong Support.

Our teachers expect great things from their students. To encourage success, they create a safe and supportive learning environment so students can stretch to do their best work, and find extra help — or greater challenges — as needed.

## Celebrating Success

### Good as Gold

We are delighted to announce that Cumberland, San Miguel, and Vargas elementary schools have been named Gold Ribbon Schools. The statewide program recognizes schools for outstanding work in implementing the new content and performance standards, which are designed to ensure students are ready for college and careers.

### It's an Honor

Two of our schools recently received Hoffman Awards from the Santa Clara County School Boards Association. Fairwood Explorer won for its parent participation program, which gives students access to more than 20 enrichment classes in addition to its rigorous standard curriculum. Cumberland Elementary was recognized for its Project-Based Learning — Leveraging Parent Engagement and Technology program, which requires that students tap a variety of academic and technical skills to tackle and resolve real-world problems.

## Support in Action

### Be the Leader

Thanks to a \$40,000 grant from the Panda Charitable Foundation, Bishop Elementary School has become the first official *The Leader in Me* school in the South Bay. A FranklinCovey initiative, *The Leader in Me* helps students to shape effective habits for high levels of achievement in school and beyond.

### Feel Well. Learn Well.

Students have a leg up on learning thanks in part to El Camino Healthcare District (ECHD), whose cumulative gifts of \$1.1 million help keep our children healthy. Funds support two full-time nurses, mental health services through Community Health Awareness Council, and fitness and nutrition education through nonprofit providers Playworks, and GoNoodle. ECHD also partners with Palo Alto Medical Foundation to promote healthy living through its 5210 initiative.

### Destination: Learning

Located just a mile away from Lakewood Elementary, Google has formed a close partnership with the school, bringing several enriching opportunities to our students. Volunteers have organized a technology fair, hosted a field trip to the company's Sunnyvale campus, and coordinated free robotics and coding classes after school. In addition, the partnership recently allowed students to experience a virtual field trip as part of Google's Expeditions Pioneer Program. With the help of the Expeditions team, a tablet, and company-supplied cardboard viewers, the teacher selects a learning destination and the whole class follows!
