#### San Miguel Elementary School Vision

San Miguel is an award winning Community School Model with a Transitional Kindergarten through Fifth grade student population. We are also a school of choice in the district that offers a "Juntos" Bilingual Program as well as a traditional Neighborhood Program. We have a strong academic focus and firmly believe in the education of the whole child. Our curriculum is standards-based, well-balanced, and student-centered. The accomplishment of our strategic objectives is guided by the "Seven Correlates of Effective Schools".

- 1. A safe and orderly school environment
- 2. A climate of high expectations for success
- 3. Strong instructional leadership
- 4. A clear and focused mission
- 5. An opportunity to learn and student time on task
- 6. Frequent monitoring of student progress

#### A Place to Learn and Grow (Learning Environment)

Located in the heart of Silicon Valley, San Miguel has an enrollment of diverse students that come to San Miguel from across Sunnyvale School District. Our school community reflects a wide range of occupations, family structures, and socio-economic levels. We believe that all children can learn and that learning is a joyous and challenging process.

San Miguel is a community of administrators, teachers, parents, and students willing to work, change and grow as we work together to provide each child with a quality education. We truly believe that it takes a collaborative effort to enable all students to meet the academic, social-emotional, multicultural, and technological challenges of the twenty-first century.

San Miguel is committed to the beliefs that:

- High expectations yield high results
- Being a multicultural and multi-lingual citizen is a benefit and advantage
- A safe, positive, and nurturing environment supports learning
- Education is the right of every child and the responsibility of the entire community

In 2013, we were named an Ashoka Changemaker School for our work around Social-Emotional Well Being with our partnerships with Acknowledge Alliance and the Collaborative for Reaching and Teaching the Whole Child.

In 2015, we were awarded as a California Gold Ribbon School for Our Community School Model.

In 2016, we were awarded as a Santa Clara School Boards Association, Glenn W. Hoffmann winner for our Community School Model.

Out of the Glenn W. Hoffmann winners, one program is selected to receive the Kristi Porter Outstanding Program Award.

In 2016, we were awarded the Kristi Porter Outstanding Program Award for our Community School Model.

In 2017, we were awarded the California School Boards Association, Golden Bell Award for our Community School Model.

#### What We Teach (Curriculum)

We fully and consistently implement the California Common Core Standards, the Next Generation Science Standards, and the CASEL framework for Social-Emotional Learning. Students also have the opportunity to develop their Bilingualism and Biliteracy in Spanish and English when in the 2-Way Dual Immersion, "Juntos Program." A variety of best practices are used at all levels to provide specific, targeted support and challenge at each students' level.

#### How We Teach and Learn (Instruction)

Meaningful, appropriate instruction occurs in our classrooms every day. This can occur via Readers' Workshop, Guided Reading, Literature Circles, Writers' Workshop, GLAD, and consistent implementation of best practices.

Our instruction is supported by technology through use of computer-based literacy, Raz Kids, and mathematics, ST Math programs, iReady and iStation.

Students receive one-on-one and small group support in the classroom during Readers' Workshop time, through Reading Partners (a non-profit organization that provides individual reading support by volunteers), through the Multi Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS), in small group before or after school tutorials, and in Kids Learning After School (KLAS).

#### The Ways We Work (Professional Growth, Planning and Environment)

San Miguel staff members deepen their instructional expertise through targeted professional development and the use of powerful, research-based practices. We do this through traditional professional development and also within our classrooms. In our classrooms, professional practice is improved and accelerated by using consistent feedback and support provided by other teachers, the instructional coaches, and the site principal.

Teachers work together in grade-levels to make data driven decisions. This allows teachers to develop Response to Intervention plans based on individual student needs.

#### Foundations for Learning (Parent Involvement and Student Support)

Parent involvement is a high priority at San Miguel School. We work with families to create productive home-school relationships to strengthen a safe and orderly school environment. Together we support the development of capable, responsible, and resilient young citizens. Parents have the opportunity to contribute in various ways. Opportunities include joining, volunteering, or supporting the following; the Parent Teacher Association (PTA), School Site Council (SSC), ELAC (English Learner Action Committee), DELAC (District ELAC), and Project Cornerstone Readers. We also encourage parents to actively participate in their children's education in and outside of the classroom. Parents are provided with frequent reports on their children's progress in English or Spanish as appropriate.

#### Conclusions from Data:

In examining our CA Healthy Kids Survey data not captured above, from 2017-2018, we are proud of our student response data. 100% of our students agree that nearly all or most adults: 1. Really care about students, 2. Want all students to do their best, 3. Listen to what students have to say, and 4. Believe that every student can be a success. We believe this stems from our positive campus climate and the dedication of our community. In examining our Panorama Survey data, not captured above, from 2018-2019, we are also proud that our families do not see that there are barriers to engagement and that they see that family engagement is high.

The California Healthy Kids Survey Data was also used in our Ashoka Changemaker School, California Gold Ribbon School, and Hoffmann Award applications.

#### Conclusions from Parent, Teacher and Student Input:

We believe that focusing on positive school climate and providing services via our Community School Model has been instrumental in decreasing school suspensions.

Teachers work with students and parents to promote a caring, positive, and respectful school. We have school-wide anti-bullying language through the school. Social-Emotional learning lessons are presented in the class in grades 3rd-5th by licensed Marriage Family Therapists. In all grade levels TK-5th, teachers explicitly teach Pro-Social-Emotional skills via Second Steps curriculum, Morning Meetings, and Integrated Social-Emotional Well Being Lessons within content areas. Teachers, other Counselors and Social Workers teach curriculum designed to instill empathy through teaching conflict resolution, anger management skills, and zones of regulation. Parents also teach Asset Building Champion (ABC) lessons in classrooms focused on building skills around Empathy and being an Upstander.

School wide Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) and Responsive Classroom training provides common language for our school, and a foundation for our students to be successful.

#### Our 3 areas of focus are:

- 1. Develop emotional regulation skills for all students.
- 2. Develop conflict resolution language for all students.
- 3. Foster empathy for all students.







#### **Safe Ingress and Egress**

#### **Getting to School:**

In keeping with Sunnyvale School District's goal of fostering awareness among our students, we strongly urge families to use means of transporting children to school other than driving. We encourage activities such as walking, bicycling with helmets, and scootering with helmets. If children are to be driven by car, carpooling is encouraged. Safety is emphasized, whatever the mode of transportation. It is everyone's responsibility to know the traffic laws surrounding the school, including appropriate speed limits (15 mph when children are present) and to obey them. Children are encouraged to follow all crossing guard directions and to use the sidewalks. The best and safest way to arrive and pick up is to allow plenty of time for travel, parking, or drop off/pick up.

#### **Crossing Guards:**

Public Safety provides trained Crossing Guards upon availability at various locations around the school, to allow for safe travel every school day, during arrival and departure times. See next page titled, "School/School District Support" for specific locations.

#### Walking:

We recommend that parents and guardians accompany TK, kindergarten and primary grades (1st -3rd) students to and from school in walking groups. Walking groups for older children (i.e. walking school buses) will foster independence and increase safety. Parents are encouraged to consult the walking routes map for your school to determine the safest routes to school. Teach, and lead by example, how to cross streets safely:

- At intersections
- In crosswalks when available
- With pedestrian crossing signal at light-signal controlled intersections
- With crossing guard assistance when available

Children must wear the required protective gear when bicycling or using a scooter and follow applicable laws and the directions of the crossing guards. Per California Law, helmets are required for all children under the age of 18.

#### Using the Passenger Drop-Off and Pick up Zone:

Drop off children and pick them up in the designated passenger drop off and pick up zones. DO NOT leave cars parked or unattended or double/tripled parked. If children are not present for pick up, continue out of the area, come back around, or park on the street in a legal parking spot, and walk up to find them. DO NOT BLOCK anyone parked in a designated handicap parking space or neighborhood driveway. Please keep traffic flowing.

Follow the directives of school staff and volunteer curb assistants (where available) in the drop off/pick up areas. Stop before the crosswalk at the entrances to the school roundabouts or driveways to wait for any pedestrians using the crosswalk. Drive as far as possible in a single file line along the drive or curb before picking up or dropping off.

# **School/District Support:**

To support the goal of fostering environmental awareness among our students, the School/School District will annually:

- o Survey students and/or parents to determine mode of travel to school. A simple survey will aid in planning for addressing transportation issues.
- o Educate, inform, and train students, parents, and staff about safe travel to and from school.
- o Review safe ingress and egress plan and procedures with staff.
